- 3. What were the effects of the Kansas-Nebraska Act on the government of the territory of Kansas?
- 4. Why was the Kansas territory referred to as the "Bleeding Kansas"?
- 5. What issue drove the creation of the Republican Party? What groups came together to create the Republican Party?
- 6. What were the legal principles established by the Dred Scott vs. Sanford case?
- 7. How did the decision in the Dred Scott case lead to worsening relationships between the North and the South?
- 8. After the raid on Harper's Ferry, How did Northerners come to perceive John Brown? How did Southerners view Brown?
- 9. Who ran for President in 1860? Which Party, and region of the Country, did each candidate represent? And, what was each candidate's stance on slavery?
- 10. How did South Carolina react to the election of Abraham Lincoln to the Presidency in 1860?
